

Dear Chancellor Porter,

We are formally writing to you again to express the Chancellor's Parent Advisory Council's stance on the "Citywide Leadership Team" (CLT). CPAC has repeatedly expressed that we are not supporting the proposed Citywide Leadership Team Structure at this time. We should be focused on improving and enhancing our existing parent structures (School Leadership Teams, District Leadership Teams, PA/PTAs, Presidents' Councils, CCECs and Citywide Councils). The belief of more oversight without accountability is folly. Increasing the number of meetings which stakeholders need to attend is not the solution but adding an unnecessary burden to all constituencies involved.

Since the A-655 explains that the Chancellor appoints individuals to combine the 32 District Comprehensive Education Plans on the DCEP, a CLT would be less inclusive and more exclusive which would create more of a divide. The 32 District Leadership Teams already represent the collaboration among the various stakeholders on each team and is a true representation of NYC.

More importantly, CPAC would like to concentrate on the immediate needs and concerns that our families and communities are facing right now and ensuring they receive adequate resources and support due to the pandemic.

We would also like to focus our attention on:

- 1. Advising the Chancellor and representing all NYC public school students and their families.
- 2. How funds are being used and is it in an equitable manner for all students?
- 3. Health and Safety/Transportation
- 4. Social Emotional and Mental Health
- 5. All IEP students receiving their mandated services
- 6. Multilingual access for all.
- 7. Brilliant NYC
- 8. Class Size Matters

- 9. The new year and new administration
- 10. Collaborating on policy changes and parent advocacy

In conclusion, if we have a Chancellor that truly believes in parent engagement and empowerment, CPACs decision would be respected as we advise the DOE Chancellor to send a notice out across the city to state that the Citywide Leadership Team does not exist and there is no plan to create another structure within the DOE. We look forward to our continue partnership and collaboration.
