Introduction to The New York State Office for New Americans Ramirez June Initiative (ONA)

• Was created in 2012 to welcome immigrants and to help them in achieving their American Dream

Who are New Americans?

New Americans refers to all people who were born outside the US who moved to the US to live here, regardless of the immigration status.

- New Americans can do people who have recently moved to the US or people who have lived in the US for decades.
- Some New Americans are people with disabilities and developmental disabilities.
- One in four New Yorkers are New Americans

About NYS ONA

- Found it in 2012, nation's first statutorily created immigrant service office.
- Of this all new American could access and navigating a variety of free services and supports through its statewide networks of community-based providers.

ONA Ramirez June Initiative

Increasing Access to Disability Services for New Americans through Outreach, Training, and Partnership.



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• The emissions is the first of its kind in the nation, it launched as a grant from the NYS Council on developmental disabilities in 2019 and continues to build capacity to support new Americans with disabilities.

What does the Ramirez June Initiative do?

- Host workshops
- Create and share multilingual resources
- Builds partnerships and provides technical assistance
- Launched the ONA Bilingual Coordinator Program, in Brooklyn, NY
- Share strategies to increase access to disability services for new Americans
- The initiative aims to help new Americans of all ages with all types of disabilities

What's in Voyage?

- Multilingual information on child development (2 months to 5 years) and the early identification of disabilities
- Each copy is bilingual with all content in English and a second language
- Provide ages for developmental screenings (starting at 9 months), autism screenings (starting at 18 months), well child visits, developmental milestones, activities to promote child development, and disability resources in New York State
- Book is available in 13 languages

ONA Bilingual Coordinator Program

- Launched in February 2023 through the ONA Ramirez June Initiative's federal grant through the Council of Developmental Disabilities (CDD)
- Bilingual case management services
- Connects families with disability and mental health services with a focus and connecting with OPWDD services
- Created resource guide on accessing disability Services
- Host workshops to respond to community needs

Office of Student Transportation OMNY by John Brenson & La Nika Parker

OMNY Overviews 2024 - 2025 What is our student OMNY program?

- OMNY cards let students ride MTA subways and MTA buses to get to and from school
- All students in grades kindergarten through 12 who live more than 0.5 mi away from their school are eligible for an OMNY card, unless they are assigned yellow bus service
- We provide OMNY cards to roughly 500,000 to 600,000 students each year

What changes were made this year?

- OMNY cards have replaced our old student MetroCard program. Eligibility criteria remain the same
- Student metrocards had specific restrictions on when they could be used
- OMNY cards have fewer restrictions. They can be used up to four taps per day; at any time of the day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year
- We've also simplified the program so that there's a single card for students in all grades

Student OMNY Card Reminders

- OMNY cards are strictly for the assigned student only and should not be sold or utilized by any unauthorized user; if anyone other than the assigned student is found using the OMNY card, it will be deactivated
- If your student has a lost or story OMNY card they should report that to their school
- If you're a student OMNY card is damaged please return the damage card to your school



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What changes are upcoming?

NYC Public Schools is working with MTA to develop a virtual OMNY program. When this program is rolled out, students will have the option to link their OMNY account to a device, eliminating the need for them to carry a physical card

• NYCPS is also partnering with MTA on various initiatives to encourage good ridership habits and reduce fare evasion

- Last year many education programs were at risk of ending in 2024 because they were funded with expiring federal stimulus funds and expiring city funds
- The city continued funding for many other key education programs that were at risk of ending
- City Council Education Hearing March 13



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What is Foundation Aid?

- Largest resource of funding from the State of NYCPS and other school districts
- Distributed to NYC and other school districts through a funding formula that provides funding for each student
- Currently being re-examined for the first time since 2007
- \$24.9B to districts across the State this year
- \$9.9B to NYCPS 25% of NYCPS's budget
